Ostrich enjoying their new home

Companion for the resident Ostrich

The Zoo resident Ostrich has found a new companion, a pair of Ostrich both aged 4 month was brought to the Zoo from Rupendehi, Nepal on October, 2013. The resident Ostrich has settled with the new pair and is enjoying her new companion.

Ostrich (Struthio camelus) is flightless birds native to Africa. It is distinctive in its appearance, with a long neck and legs, and can run at up to about 70km/h (43mph), the fastest land speed of any bird and lays the largest eggs of any living bird. The ostrich's diet consists mainly of plant matter, though it also eats invertebrates. It lives in nomadic groups of 5 to 50 birds. When threatened, the ostrich will either hide itself by lying flat against the ground, or run away. If cornered, it can attack with a kick of its powerful legs. Mating patterns differ by geographical region, but territorial males fight for a harem of two to seven females. The ostrich is farmed around the world, particularly for its feathers, which are decorative and are also used as feather dusters.

Four Horned Antelope

The two male Four horned antelope rescued by the Banke National park was brought to the Zoo in July 2013 . Both of them are tentatively 6 and two month of age and are good in health.

The four-horned antelope (Tetracerus quadricornis), or chousingha, is a smallest antelope standing only 55 to 64cm (22 to 25in) at the shoulder. The most distinctive feature of the animal is the presence of four horns; a feature unique among extant mammals. Only the males grow horns, usually with two between the ears and a second pair further forward on the forehead. The first pair of horns appears at just a few months of age, and the second pair generally grows after 10 to 14 months. The horns are never shed, although they may be damaged during fights. Four-horned antelope are generally solitary animals, although they are occasionally found in groups of up to four individuals.

Free Eye Clinic and Eye Donation Awareness Program

As many as 90 Central Zoo Staff received free eye check-up service in a camp conducted at NTNC-Central Zoo, Jawalakhel on 4th September, 2013. Specialist doctors from the Tilganga Eye Hospital had provided free eye check-up services and medicine to the staff.

Brief introduction on the eye donation program was conducted. They also provided eye donation willingness forms to all the staff. According to the specialists from Tilganga Eye hospital ,in 2011, 163 corneas were collected for surgery at Tilganga's eye bank, of which 150 were used for transplantation at Tilganga, 6 were donated to Bhutan, and 7 were distributed to other hospitals in Nepal .The eye clinic program was very fruitful for all the staff.
